If e'er it's used to light the street—*electrifying scene!*

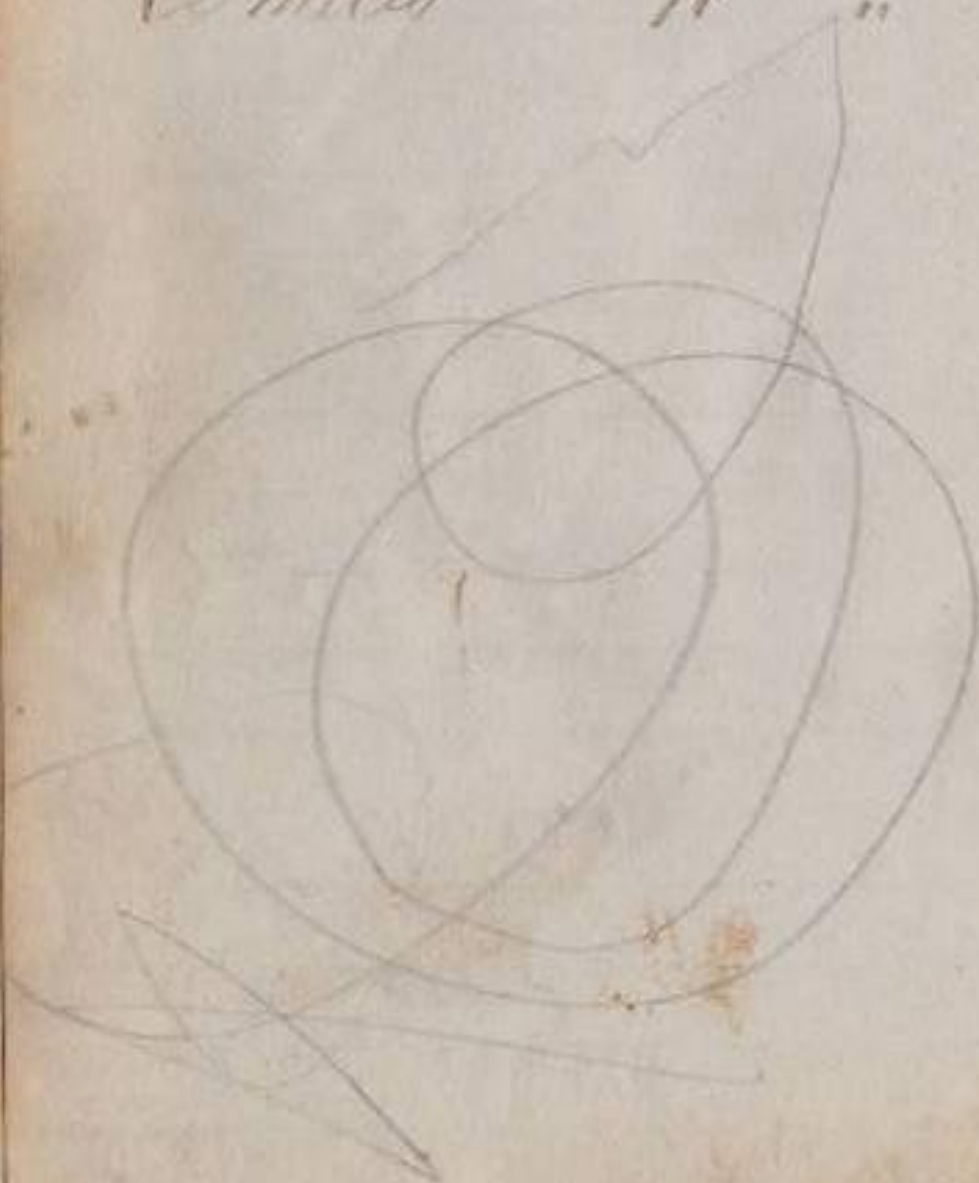

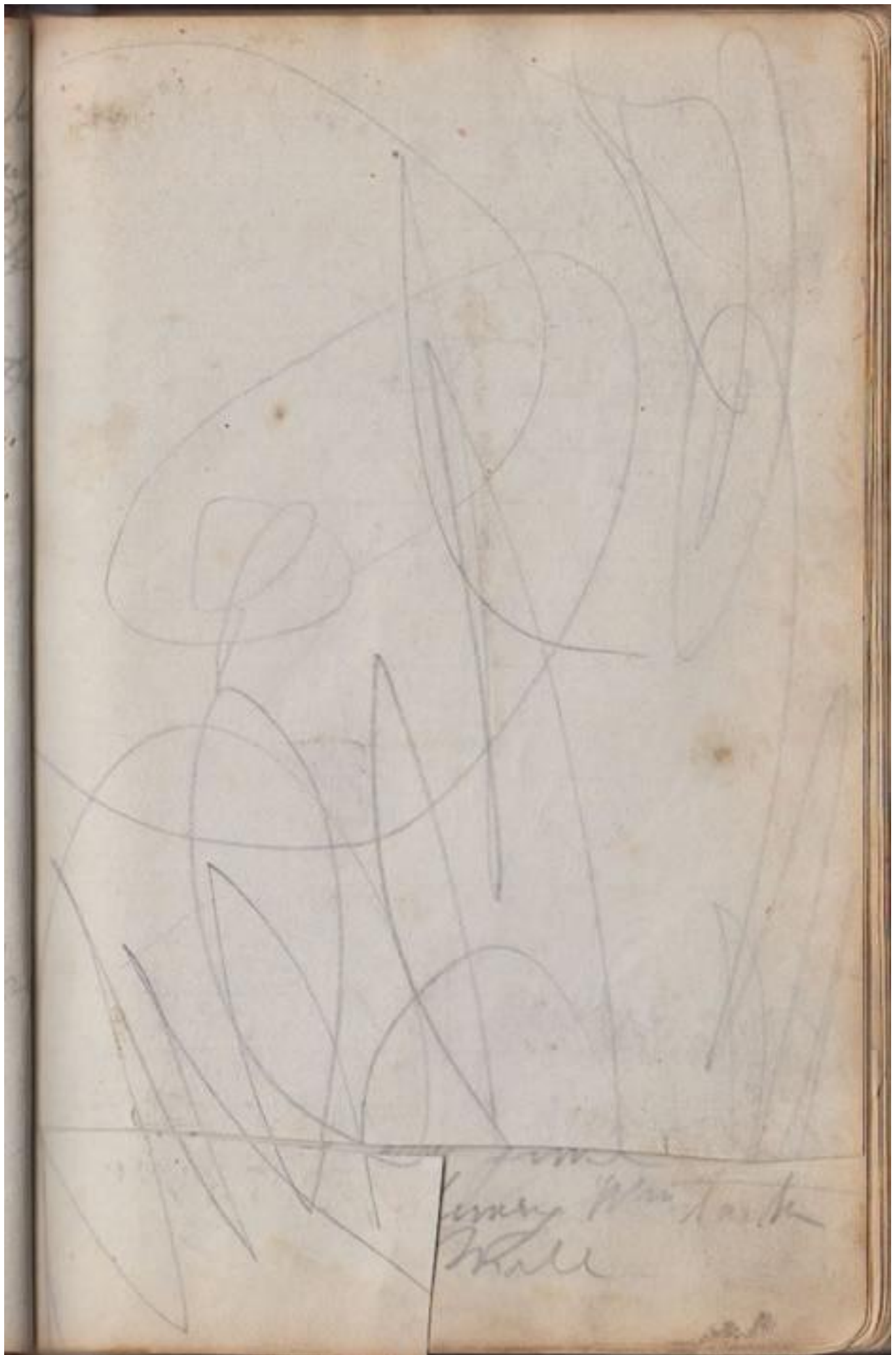
